## **Second Sunday of Advent**

Mark 1:1-8 or Luke 3:1-6 or Matthew 3:1-12

## "A voice crying out in the desert..."

Matthew records in today's gospel!

I would to ask three questions:

- 1. Whose voice?
- 2. What type of voice is it?
- 3. Why is this voice "crying"?

Before answering these questions, let's us define what a **voice is?** 

A "voice" is the <u>power</u> of uttering <u>sounds</u> through the mouth to <u>express</u> an <u>opinion</u>, a <u>wish</u> or a <u>message!</u>
The **voice** in today's gospel is fitting this description to the "t."

It is a **powerful voice uttering an important message!**Whose voice is it?

This "voice" belongs none other than the precursor, the forerunner of Our Lord and Messiah, John the Baptist!

Second. What type of voice is it?

It is a **voice** <u>calling</u> people's attention to an important message.

Just like the "town criers" of old who were sent to make public announcements in the streets or in the marketplaces!

John's principal "call" in life was to "point out to people Jesus—the long awaited-Messiah."

John spends his entire life **preparing** himself for this **ministry** by **prayering** and **fasting & nourishing** himself on **locusts** (grasshoppers) and **wild honey...mmm...good!** 

John's lifestyle was also a sign of self-sacrifice.

As a prophet, he renounced the luxuries of this life seen from his daily diet to his choice of clothing which were made of camel's hair fastened by a leather belt around his waist.

John wore a camel's hair fastened with a leather belt

John the Baptist lived, ate, and dressed like a prophet of his time. In fact, John the Baptist would become the last great prophet of the Old Testament!

John's voice is unique because it is "crying in the desert."

It is a "voice" which revealed that God Almighty had entrusted this humble prophet a great ministry.

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The ministry "to call" people's attention and to "point" them to His Son, Jesus of Nazareth.

**John** is recorded saying that when he saw **Jesus walking** by, he said to his own disciples

"There goes the Lamb of God."

## Third. Why is the voice crying?

This detail is important because a "crying voice" is very different than a "speaking voice." The voice of a speaker normally speaks plainly and calmly.

John's voice contains a "cry." A cry is a lamentation expressing grief and sorrow of a situation.

## What was John crying about?

John, like any prophetic voice recognized that the people were <u>not</u> living grace-filled lives according to God's ways, rather living a life of sin. This caused the **Baptist** to experience **sorrow and grief. God's** heart always experiences sorrow when choose sin over virtue.

John's cry is a lamentation <u>expressing</u> sorrow and grief, but the voice is also filled with hope.

A sincere hope that people would come back to God and receive the "Baptism of repentance through the forgiveness of sins" to prepare the way of the Lord.

Does this sound strange to us? It shouldn't!

Because the first step towards conversion is admitting that we have sinned.

Once we recognize our sins and acknowledge them, then we confess them to God in the Sacrament of Confession to experience God's Mercy and Joy.

When we confess our sins sincerely and humbly then our conversion process will also help other to prepare themselves for the coming of Christ Jesus.

Sins need to be first identified, then acknowledged and finally uproot them!

Much like a painful decaying tooth, that once identified and located, it needs to be uprooted immediately otherwise it could infect the whole body.

I will close with a **true story** that reminds us of the importance of listening to the **"right voice"** whether it is the **voice** of our informed conscience, the **voice** of Scripture, the **voice** of the Church or even the **prophetic voice** in our midst.

"A friend approached his <u>nonbelieving friend</u> and told him the conversion of several of his friends who after reading **Holy Scriptures** became believers. The <u>nonbelieving friend</u> after hearing their stories of conversion one after the other, left and went into the garden to weep bitterly in his agony. Then, suddenly he heard a "voice" of a child saying to him, "Take it and read it, take it and read it." This nonbeliever understood this "voice" as a "divine command" and he opened his book of Holy Scripture and read it; finally, he was converted to Christianity!

Amazingly, the "voice" of the Child was identified that of Christ and the man who heard it and listened to it and was converted to Christianity was none other than the famous son of St. Monica, Augustine.

Interestingly, Augustine, after his own conversion experience became a prophetic voice for the world as a priest, bishop, saint, and doctor of the Roman Catholic Church!

Whose voice are you and I listening to these days?
